

## **Public Policy**



November 2024 Election – Florida Constitutional Amendment 1 Whether you chose to vote in person or by mail it is not hard to realize that election season is upon us. The Florida Constitution has six amendments for voters to decide on. This month we will focus on Amendment 1.

#### What would Amendment 1 do?

This amendment would require candidates to disclose their political party in both primary and general school board elections.

#### Background

In 1998 Florida voters approved a ballot measure to make the school board races nonpartisan. The thought was that without party designations voters would look at the candidates and vote for whomever was best suited for their community and school. In 2023 the Florida legislature, with the support of Governor Ron DeSantis, passed a measure to disclose the candidate's political party in school board primaries and elections. The measure to become part of the Florida Constitution, 60% of the voters must agree.

Four states – Alabama, Connecticut, Louisiana and Pennsylvania – label school board candidates by party. Other states either allow school districts to decide for themselves or do not indicate political party.

#### Supporters' Position – Vote Yes to require disclosure of political party

In our busy lives we often use political party as a shorthand for our positions and disclosing political party would make it easier for voters to vote accordingly.

#### Critics' Position - Vote No to keep school board elections nonpartisan

Opponents of Amendment 1 say that passing Amendment 1 would further divide school boards and communities. Without political affiliation, voters could select candidates who best represent their views and the needs of the community. In Florida, voters must be registered with a party to vote in a primary. Since many voters today are unaffiliated, they would not have a voice in the most basic issues facing their communities if elections were not nonpartisan.

#### Conclusion

There is a lot going on politically in 2024 and the school board amendment might get lost in all the discussion. It deserves attention. Whether you currently have children in

school, they graduated, or you never had children in school, the school board represents the basic beliefs of a community.

Come to the October General Meeting to learn about all six amendments so you can be an informed voter and decide for yourself.



## **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion**

#### Great Reads from DEI

*Corky Lee's Asian America: Fifty Years of Photographic Justice* Corky Lee, Chee Wang Ng, & Mae Ngai Published April 9, 2024

Known throughout his lifetime as the "undisputed, unofficial Asian American photographer laureate," the late photojournalist Corky Lee documented Asian American and Pacific Islander communities for 50 years, breaking the stereotype of Asian Americans as docile, passive, and, above all, foreign to this country. This collection of over 200 breathtaking photos is a stunning retrospective of his life's work--a selection of the best photographs from his vast collection, from his start in New York's Chinatown in the 1970s until his untimely passing in 2021.



Featuring never-before-seen photographs alongside his best-known images, this book represents Lee's mission as an activist social photographer to chronicle a history of inclusion, resistance, ethnic pride, and patriotism. Iconic photographs feature protests against police brutality in New York in the 1970s, a Sikh man draped in an American flag after 9/11, a reenactment of the completion of the transcontinental railroad of 1869 featuring descendants of Chinese railroad workers, and his last photos of community life and struggle during the coronavirus pandemic.

Asian American writers, artists, activists, and friends of Lee reflect on his life and career and provide rich historical and cultural context to his photographs. It is a fitting epitaph to a beloved photographer who sought to change the world, one photograph at a time.

## **Great Decisions**

We are planning to hold the *Great Decisions* discussion group again this year. This is an activity prepared every year by the Foreign Policy Association in New York, a non-partisan association which analyzes issues from a geo-political and historical perspective. We use their prepared text and read one chapter per week on the topic of the week. During our meetings, we discuss the reading and watch a video lecture on the topic which expands on the readings. Members of the group in past years have found the experience very worthwhile and often a real stretch from how we have thought of the issues in the past.



We will have two groups on different days. Our schedule will be 9:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. on either Monday or Tuesday (your choice) for 8 weeks. Our meetings will begin on Monday, January 20 (yes, I know that's MLK day) and Tuesday, January 21. The meetings will run for 8 weeks and end on March 10 and 11.
