Public Policy



Today, the workforce is more diverse than ever and not everyone comes to the workplace every day. These are among the changes that are happening now and will continue at an accelerated pace. Diversity and Telework are what today's workers, employers, and society are adapting to.

Diversity

The demographics of the country are changing rapidly resulting in a very different workplace. Since 2019, most new hires of prime age workers (ages 25-54) were people of color. In 2020, the U.S. population under age 18 became "majority minority" – the number of individuals who are multiracial and ethnic minorities exceeded those of

whites. Today people have different expectations of how they will work and what is important to them.

Telework

How people work is changing. Between 80% and 90% of today's workers would like to telework at least part-time. Going to a specific place of work five days a week is not essential in many fields to get the job done. About 23% of the total U.S. workforce work remotely at least part of the time, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Because employees do not want the same things from a job that prior workers did, employers must recognize and address these differences. The U.S. population is becoming more diverse and it is to the benefit of employers to have diverse employees who can better relate to customers' needs and wants.

Employers must ensure that there is equal pay and benefits, flexibility, a supportive culture and that solid recruitment, retention, and promotion policies are in place and part of the culture of the organization.

Although written in 1963, the Bob Dylan song "The Times They Are A-Changing" is as relevant today as ever.

Solito: A Memoir

by Javier Zamora

Javier Zamora tells the inspiring story of his three-thousand-mile journey from his small town in El Salvador, through Guatemala and Mexico, and across the U.S. border. At the tender age of nine, he left behind his beloved aunt and grandparents to reunite with a mother who had gone four years earlier and a father he barely remembered. Traveling alone amid a group of strangers and a "coyote" hired to lead them, Javier expected his trip to last two short weeks.

He cannot foresee the perilous boat trips, relentless desert treks, pointed guns, arrests and deceptions that await him; nor can he

know that those two weeks will expand into two life-altering months alongside fellow migrants who will come to encircle him like an unexpected family. *Solito* provides an intimate account not only of a treacherous journey, but also of the kindness and love delivered at the most unexpected moments. It is a tale of bravery and hope.




Book Club

Steve Poltz Concert and Claudia Schmidt Encore



Planning for our fundraising concert featuring entertainer Steve Poltz is moving right along. Steve is a Canadian-American alt/folk singer, songwriter, guitarist, and storyteller. He was a founding member of the California rock band Rugburn. Now, as a solo artist, he often performs acoustic-only "good old-fashioned sing-along" shows.

We have secured the Venetian Center at Leesburg's Venetian Park for our event on **Wednesday**, **n** with the doors opening at 1:20 n m

February 26 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. with the doors opening at 1:30 p.m.

There are 450 seats available, all at circular tables, and we will have trays of cookies and bottled water on each table for refreshments.

Lake/Sumter AAUW

Tickets are \$30 for General Seating and \$15 for Students; the front four (4) tables will include donor seating at \$100 per seat or \$1,000 per table. Online ticket sales will be available January 10 on our website (<u>https://www.lakesumteraauw.org</u>).

Marketing plans are underway. With over 400 tickets to sell we will be marketing far and wide, and we plan that the show will be a sell-out. You can help by sharing the flyer for this event (see page 13) with friends and neighbors.

In addition, Claudia Schmidt will be playing an intimate concert at Leslie Flanders' home on Tuesday, January 14 from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. There are 40 seats at \$30 each, and each person or couple needs to bring an appetizer to share. The Flanders will provide beer, wine, soft drinks, and water.

Claudia has reduced her fee by half so that we can raise funds to pay for the incidental expenses of the Steve Poltz concert. Give Leslie a call if you want her to reserve a seat for you. Donors have already contributed \$4,000 for the entertainer and \$440 for the venue. The Claudia Schmidt concert should bring in another \$700 to cover the refreshments.

The net proceeds of both concerts will be used for our Tech Trek camperships and our college scholarships for women in the final two years of their undergraduate study.

Tech Trek

The focus of the **January General Meeting** will be to recognize girls who attended the 2024 Tech Trek Summer Camps. The meeting will be held at **Allamanda Recreation Center** on **Saturday**, **January 25**, **2025**.



The week-long Tech Trek Summer Camps provide an opportunity for middle school girls who are entering 8th grade to experience classes and workshops that emphasize STEM (Science, Engineering, Technology, and Mathematics). Lake/Sumter AAUW is the only organization in The Villages that promotes the summer camps.


