The Future of Our Branch

With the Board's approval of our strategic plan, our branch now has a focused direction for future activities. The future looks bright to us, and we are excited and energized to begin work under the new plan.



We presented the logic behind the plan and an overview of our goals at the April 23 General Meeting. Rather than recap that information here, interested members can view the video of the meeting at this link:

We do want to reiterate our **strategic vision** and what it means for branch operations. The vision is straightforward and represents fulfilment of members' needs for stimulating learning opportunities and opportunities to support girls and women as they begin their educational journeys, especially in STEM fields:

Lake/Sumter AAUW will be the premiere organization in Lake and Sumter Counties that offers college-educated women stimulating learning opportunities as well as opportunities to give back to the community.

It is our hope that the plan and the rationale behind it will resonate with members, that you will embrace the vision, and will contribute actively to the future of the branch. Recall the 3Ts: Time, Talents, and Treasures. We need all you can offer.

Our plan includes four **goals** that flow directly from the strategic vision and will guide work for the next 5 years.

GOAL 1: Differentiate us by developing and providing dynamic learning opportunities targeted to college-educated women.

GOAL 2: Organize robust efforts to Recruit, Engage, and Retain Members, especially targeting new eligible women moving into Sumter (and eventually Lake) County.

GOAL 3: Enhance and create opportunities to support young women beginning their journeys in STEM fields.

GOAL 4: Reorganize branch committee structure to create a framework that enhances branch governance. Lots of opportunities to connect, get involved, shape future

While the goals are for 5 years, we have written **objectives** for the 2022-23 fiscal year. During this year, we will be working on Goals 1, 2, and 4, laying a foundation for future work in these areas. Future presidents-elect will have the opportunity to review goals and objectives and specify the objectives for the year they are presidents.

Our first two goals – program development and member recruitment – offer numerous opportunities for members to get involved in the work of the branch. We are not asking anyone to take on a chair position, and we are trying to break projects into smaller tasks...pieces that will be easier to commit to than long-term obligations.

In Program Development, we need to build a list of topics for General Meeting programs but also for any programs we might offer to the community as fundraisers. Creating the topics and identifying presenters and resources for each one does not require a long-term commitment. While the co-Directors of Programs are engaged with our ongoing programs, two or three members could help by brainstorming topics and beginning the research for resources.

A member recruitment drive is already in the works for next year; we will need lots of people, each doing small and/or short-term tasks, to make that drive happen.

In addition to presenting our strategic plan at the April General Meeting, we also introduced members to our new website. Please visit the site at

https://lakesumteraauw.org and let us know what you think. The Members' Page is still under construction, so not all links are live. The Members' Page is the area that serves YOU, the membership, so tell us what other resources and information you'd like to see in that part of the site. Note that, if you want to read the full strategic plan, there is a link to it on the Members' Page.

The Members' page is password protected. We sent the password to all members by email after the April meeting. We are not re-publishing it here because this newsletter is available to non-members on our site. If you can't find the message, let us know, and we'll send you the password again.

We also want to change the pictures on the site frequently. So, if you're a photography enthusiast send us pictures of branch events...preferably in landscape orientation and in jpeg. format. And because we don't expect one person alone to be our branch photographer, if several of you are interested, band together and arrange when and where each of you will show up, camera in hand.

With a focused plan and a website that communicates who we are to the public, we are ready to step into the future and make it ours. Please bring your three Ts and join in the fun.

Opportunities to Offer Your Time & Talents



To help you choose where to contribute your time and talents, here is a list of our committees along with descriptions of the tasks assigned to each one. Please keep in mind that these are *committee* tasks and are not expected to be carried out by one person.

Standing Committees

Communications Committee is chaired by the Director of Communications, who is appointed by the President and confirmed by a majority of Board members. The committee charge is to contribute to PR plan development and implementation as well as to photograph branch events and to ensure that internal and external communications present a unified image of our branch. The Communications



Director position is currently open. Basic committee members include newsletter editor, email distributor, social media chair; the committee needs additional members.

Fundraising Committee is chaired by the Director of Fundraising, who is appointed by the President and confirmed by a majority of Board members. The committee charge is to initiate, plan, and execute events to garner support for our Tech Trek and scholarship programs and to work collaboratively with Programs Committee to plan and implement fundraisers. Diane Jacobson currently holds the Director of Fundraising position, but it will be vacant as of July 1; the committee needs additional members.

Public Policy Committee is chaired by the Director of Public Policy, who is appointed by the President and confirmed by a majority of Board members. The committee charge is to keep members informed of National and State public policy issues and actions and to encourage participation in advocacy events. Judy Bonn is currently the Director of Public Policy, but the position will be vacant as of July 1; the committee needs additional members.

Operations Committees

Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion (DEI) Committee helps plan and implement activities and events focused on DEI issues. This committee has been on hiatus but will be resuming work in the fall. Jacquie Latzer will chair the committee; some committee members may be returning, but new members are always welcome.

Hospitality Committee greets attendees at General Meetings; it also plans/provides refreshments, as needed. This committee is active again as we return to live meetings. It is not labor-intensive and is a great way for members who are new to branch activities to get involved.

Membership Committee greets attendees at meetings, supports new members, arranges New Member Coffees, and assists with recruitment events. Co-directors have been doing all membership tasks, which are essential to our branch. Karen Pickelshimer and Gay Birchard will co-chair this committee in 2022-23. There are lots of jobs to do; Karen and Gay need lots of committee members.

Nominating Committee develops the slate of officers for branch elections. It is a short-term committee that requires three (3) members and one (1) alternate, including a former branch president, a member of the board of directors, and a member of the branch. Their work is short-term and done primarily in the winter for announcement of the slate in the spring.

Programs Committee plans presentations for General Meetings and helps make meeting arrangements and meeting plans; it also collaborates with Fundraising Committee to plan fundraisers. In 2022-23, Carolyn Pasquale and Bonnie Weaver will chair this committee. This busy committee needs additional members.

Scholarship Committee notifies local colleges, reviews applications, and follows up by mentoring recipients. Kathy Mason currently chairs this committee. Contact her to learn if she needs more committee members.

Social Media Committee maintains the branch website and Facebook page, and it considers other options as needed. This new committee needs people who are familiar with various social media platforms who can provide guidance for the branch.

Tech Trek Committee contacts schools, interviews candidates, and follows up by mentoring recipients. Liz Schweers and Laura McLaughlin currently co-chair this committee and will continue in 2022-23, but they will need help with candidate interviews and final recommendations.

The best way to feel a part of the branch is to participate actively and collaboratively in branch operations. We hope you all will heed the call and volunteer.

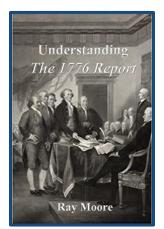

Great Read from the DEI Committee

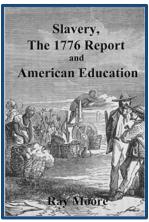


The 1776 Report was published under the Trump administration in January, 2021 as a counter to The New York Times' 1619

Project. The report argues the case for patriotic education and criticizes those who see America as a systemically and structurally racist country. Although it was withdrawn almost immediately by the Biden administration, the report will undoubtedly impact the writing of state education laws, school curricula, and textbooks for years to come.

Jill Moss Greenberg, friend of the DEI Committee, has recommended two recent books written by Villages resident Ray

Moore to refute that report. As an immigrant with a keen interest in American history, Moore offers the unique perspective of someone who is not a product of the American education system. He is the author of numerous well-researched books, but these two specifically address issues currently being debated in regard to the curricula of the public schools. The books are available as inexpensive paperbacks at Amazon. com.



<u>Understanding The 1776 Report</u> is an analysis of the text in which Moore attempts to separate fact from myth and valid from invalid arguments. He looks for common ground and then focuses on differences between viewpoints. The book has three sections:

- ➤ A preface and introduction that give the author's perspective.
- > A glossary that explains key terms used to talk about slavery and racism.
- A reader's guide to *The 1776 Report* that includes helpful questions and detailed commentary.

Slavery, *The 1776 Report* and American Education presents a fact-based history of slavery in America, placing it in its global and historical context. The book deals comprehensively with the arguments *The 1776 Report* and its implications for the future of American education--what schools and colleges teach about race and how they teach it.

Mah Jongg



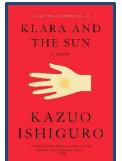
