Trek experiences for middle school girls and scholarships for college students. The goal is equality of opportunity in education, employment, and pay.



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501(c)(3) News

Our Branch has achieved 501(c)(3) status as a tax-exempt charity under Federal and State laws. A 501(c)(3) status allows us to solicit funds that will be tax deductible for the donors. Lack of tax-exempt status has been a stumbling block to our fundraising efforts, especially soliciting donations from area businesses and associations.



Great Read from the Diversity Committee



Mott Street: A Chinese American Family's Story of Exclusion and Homecoming by Ava Chin

As the only child of a single mother in Queens, Ava Chin found her family's origins to be shrouded in mystery. Over years of painstaking research, Chin traces the story of her pioneering family members who emigrated from the Pearl River Delta, crossing the Pacific in the mid-19th century to work on the transcontinental railroad. After enduring brutal racism in frontier towns, her ancestors moved east to New York City's Chinatown.

Chin's quest leads her to Mott Street, where so many Chinese Americans would live, begin families, and craft new identities. She discovers the men and women who became merchants, "paper son" refugees, activists, and heads of the Chinese tongs. It also meant confronting the weight of the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882—the first federal law to restrict immigration by race and nationality, barring Chinese immigrants from citizenship for six decades. *Mott Street* uncovers a legacy of resilience that speaks to the American experience, past and present.

Day Trip



Step back in time...Saturday, November 11, 2023

Our AAUW Lake/Sumter Branch fall outing will be an historical trip through central Florida. On **November 11**, we will **travel to Clermont** for a day of discovery!

Our first stop will be the Citrus Tower, at 141 S. Hwy 27, Clermont. This landmark was here long before the famous "mouse" arrived. It was said you could see from the Gulf to the Atlantic on a clear day! Built in 1956 it was the vision of Ralph Harper. The original Tower was to be 60 feet, but when it was finished it reached 226 feet! The Florida Tower Corporation owned the tower, it had 300 stockholders from 22 states. From the late 1950's through the early 1960's the tower had 500,000 visitors per year.

During this time, you could see beautiful orange groves surrounding the rolling hills of Clermont. Now you can see the growth of Clermont in housing developments, its

shimmering lakes and neighborhoods. The admission cost is \$10.00 for 55+; the hours are 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. There is a gift shop and snack bar.

Our next stop is right next door at 123 S. Hwy 27 in Clermont: The Presidents Hall of Fame. It has been adapted from a wax museum called the House of Presidents. There are life-size figures as well as knee-high and doll size president statuettes. You can view replicas of the White House china, miniature versions of the White House rooms, and tiny documents, as well as the beautiful dresses of the Presidents' wives. The admission cost is \$15, and the hours are from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.





Our last stop of the day will be Clermont Historic Village Museum at 490 West Avenue, Clermont. They ask for a donation, and the hours are from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., but they are only open Saturday and Sunday. The Historic Village is a collection of buildings from the late 1800's that the city decided to protect. They are Herring Hooks Schoolhouse, Cooper Memorial Library, an outhouse, Clermont's train depot, Quonset Hut WWII Museum, Kern House, and Towsend House. The Village was founded in

1998 with the cooperation of the City of Clermont. The buildings are furnished with the décor of their time. On Saturdays there are guides and recordings in each of the buildings. All the buildings are close to each other, and it is an easy walk from one to another. The Historic Village is very near Lake Minneola, which as a lovely lake side park.

It is suggested to tour the Tower and Presidents Hall of Fame, then meet for lunch (location to be announced) and then continue to the Historic Village which opens at 1:00 p.m.

You may also want to explore the historic business district of Clermont or some of the commercial stores along route 27 before returning home. You should allow 1 hour to drive from Colony Recreation Center to the Citrus Tower (directions to follow for participants).
