# **Public Policy**

#### Florida Constitutional Amendments 2024

There are six amendments to the Florida state constitution on the ballot in 2024. Of the six proposed amendments four are Legislatively Referred Constitutional Amendment (LRCA). These LRCA (numbers 1, 2, 5,6) are amendments that require the legislature to seek voter approval to amend the constitution. Forty-nine states allow LRCA amendments.

Two other proposed amendments (numbers 3, 4) are Citizen Referred Constitutional Amendments (CICA). While many states revise their constitution, Florida is one of only 18 states that allow citizens to put an issue before the voters.

Although Florida allows citizens to put an issue before voters, it is not an easy process and needs 60% voter approval to become part of the Florida State constitution.

#### What Are the Amendments

The CICA Amendments are proposals 3 and 4.

Amendment proposal 3 would legalize recreational marijuana for adults 21 years and older. Individuals would be allowed to possess up to three ounces (or about 85 grams) of marijuana for personal use.

Legalized marijuana exists in 37 states. There is no evidence that legalizing its use increases underage consumption. Keeping it illegal perpetrates a criminal culture.

Amendment proposal 4 provides a constitutional right to abortion before fetal viability, which is estimated to be around 24 weeks, or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider.

This comes after the Florida Governor, Ron DeSantis, and lawmakers approved preventing abortions after 6 weeks of pregnancy effective May 1, 2024.

All Floridians deserve the freedom to make personal medical decisions, free of government intrusion. Politicians and the government should not interfere in such personal decisions and limit the ability of doctors and nurses to treat patients.

The LRCA amendments are regarding school board elections, the right to hunt and fish, the homestead property exemption, and public campaign financing. Why This Matters




Woman, Life, Freedom by Marjane Satrapi




On September 13, 2022, a young Iranian student, Mahsa Amini, was arrested for not wearing the headscarf required for women by the Islamic Republic. At the police station, she was beaten badly until she fell into a deep coma and died three days later. A wave of protests soon spread through the country, and crowds adopted the slogan "Woman, Life, Freedom"—words that have been chanted around the world during solidarity rallies. In a powerful collection of full-color, graphic-novel-style essays, Marjane Satrapi has collaborated with over 20 activists, artists, journalists, and academics to depict the historic uprising, in solidarity with the Iranian people and in defense of feminism.

Where Rivers Part: A Story of My Mother's Life by Kao Kalia Yang

Tswb was born in 1961 in war-torn Laos; when she was a teenager, the country erupted into genocidal attacks on the Hmong people. Tswb and her family fled their village for the jungle, eventually settling in a refugee camp. After marrying and having children, Tswb and her husband emigrated to the US, where the determined couple enrolled in high school, even though they were both nearly thirty, and worked grueling jobs to provide for their daughters. Kao Kalia Yang reveals her mother's astonishing saga with tenderness and unvarnished clarity, giving voice to the countless resilient refugees who are often overlooked as one of the essential foundations of this country.



The Black Box: Writing the Race by Henry Louis Gates, Jr.



Distilled over many years from Henry Louis Gates, Jr.'s legendary Harvard introductory course in African American Studies, this is the story of Black self-definition in America through the prism of the writers who have led the way. Through essays, speeches, novels, plays, and poems, a long line of creative thinkers has resisted confinement in the "black box" to record the compelling saga of the creation of a people, in resistance to the lies of racism over the course of the country's history.


### Who's Afraid of Gender? by Judith Butler

Judith Butler, the groundbreaking thinker whose iconic book *Gender Trouble* redefined how we think about gender and sexuality, confronts the attacks on "gender" that are fueling reactionary politics around the world. The anti-gender movement demonizes struggles for equality, seeks to nullify reproductive justice, and leaves millions of people vulnerable to sexual and gender violence. Imagining new possibilities for both freedom and solidarity, Butler offers a timely and hopeful work of social and political analysis—to make a broad coalition with all those whose struggle for equality is linked with fighting injustice.
